We head home Tuesday. The plan is to go over Independence pass. We will come out at Buena Vista. South to 285 and back home.

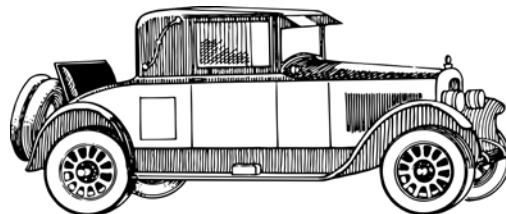

In all our travels, never have we encountered such genuine friendliness as we found in Laurel, MS and the surrounding area. We knew only one thing about Laurel, that it was the city the HGTV show Home Town was filmed. That's it! But in our 2½ days there we learned so much more.

Ben and Erin Napier, the hosts of the show, are known by practically everyone in a city of 20,000. They've aired only two seasons and are beginning to tape their 3<sup>rd</sup>. On the show, they come across as caring, down to earth people and are so proud of their community. They are trying to help bring it back to its former glory, restoring it one house at a time. She's the designer and he's the woodworker and laborer.

Our first stop in town was the Mercantile they opened in partnership with two other couples. It sells pieces Ben built in his woodworking shop along with household items. The ladies working there were very friendly and helped us with directions.



In the old downtown, the streets are brick and rough, so we chose to walk for blocks to see it up close. With no particular destination in mind, we stumbled on to the Laurel Visitor Center. It shared the building with several other businesses, but we found a huge placard of Ben & Erin advertising their Home Town show along with flyers of things to see and do in the area.

Ross, the guy who came out to greet us was very friendly, asking where we were from and what brought us to Laurel. When we said Denver and we came because of Home Town, within seconds big Ben himself walked out from an office to introduce himself and welcome us to Laurel. We chatted for 15 or 20 minutes and he introduced Ross, explaining his was the first house they featured on Season 1. Then he said we didn't come all this way and not get a picture, so Ross took my phone while we posed with 6'6" big Ben. (I wanted a picture so bad but didn't want to impose!)

By the time we left we had a great recommendation for lunch and an invite to the YWCO's Friday night fundraiser where Ben & Erin would be the guest speakers. We were thrilled!

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That afternoon we took a walking tour of the historic district, 24 buildings in all, which we truly enjoyed. The houses and churches were magnificent and surrounded by live oak trees. We even had two gentlemen stop us to inquire if they could help us and did we find what we were looking for. They asked again where we were from and welcomed us to Laurel.

The next day we decided to ride to Mt. Olive, a little town of 1,000 just 30 miles away. I had a brochure advertising the Basket Cottage operated by an Amish lady who made hand-woven baskets. So off we went! We found some pretty cool country roads to ride on the way which made it even more enjoyable. We were hardly off the bikes when an Amish gentleman came out to greet us.

Ten minutes later another gentleman out walking stopped by to greet us as well. Once they knew all about us we made our way in to the basket shop and left with a pecan and seagrass basket in hand along with directions to the drug store down the street that served hand-dipped ice cream.

Now, this town was very depressed with only a few store fronts occupied on Main Street. It was easy to find the drug store! We hardly had our helmets off when people started pouring out the front door! They wanted to know all about us and what we were doing in Mt. Olive. When we said ice cream they were thrilled!



The lady who originally owned the store was 80 years old and she sat on Mike's bike for a picture while another lady hopped on mine. Their friends took many pictures! Eventually we made it inside and were given the complete history of this family-owned business. The lady who dished up our ice cream told us even more about their little town and would not let us pay for it or the tiny glass bottles of Coke she gave us. Everyone was happy, laughing and joking, but to look out the door you might wonder why.

By the time we left, we asked if we were going to make the front page of their newspaper. They all laughed and said no but the town has a Facebook page

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and they would definitely be posting pictures on it. (Later I found it and posted a picture myself telling them how much we enjoyed our visit. Eight people commented on it wishing us safe travels and inviting us to stop by to see them again.) I think we made their day!

Back in Laurel we waited for the fundraiser to begin. Sitting on a bench we had a gentleman yell across the street where we were from. (Did we look that obvious?) When we said Denver, he said he had to come across the street to shake our hands. It's amazing how many people know someone, friend or family, who live in Colorado, as did he. He asked if we were having a good time and if we saw the old historic homes. When I said we did but never found Ben & Erin's home, he proceeded to tell us exactly where it was and went on to say what good people they were.

At the fundraiser all the ladies working it had heard about us and were falling all over themselves welcoming us to Laurel. As we sat at a table enjoying a homemade treat we were joined by an elderly lady all alone who had overheard the greetings and knew we were from out of town. She visited with us for nearly an hour telling us how wonderful Ben & Erin are. She said what you see on TV is exactly who they are, and you'll see them out and about in town, speaking to everyone they meet, thus the home town feel. She first met Ben at the Methodist Church she attended when he ran the youth ministry long before the TV show. She's known him for a long time and claims he hasn't changed a bit.

The program finally started and at the

end of their talk, Ben & Erin invited anyone who would like to take a picture with them to line up, so I jumped right in. When it was my turn, Ben asked me where my husband was, then told Erin we were the folks from Denver he ran into yesterday at the visitor center. So, I got another picture with both of them!



On our way back to the campground we drove past their house, and I realized I already had a picture of it not knowing it was theirs. I just thought it was a really neat Craftsman!

The next morning, we were loading up the bikes when another camper stopped by in his car and told us how much he admired us. He explained how he saw us all over town the past two days. This led to who we were, where we were from, etc. We told him how amazed we were at the friendliness we encountered by everyone we met. He explained he moved there

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from South Africa (he had the accent) and had tried living in many different places but found Laurel to feel like home and that's where he landed.

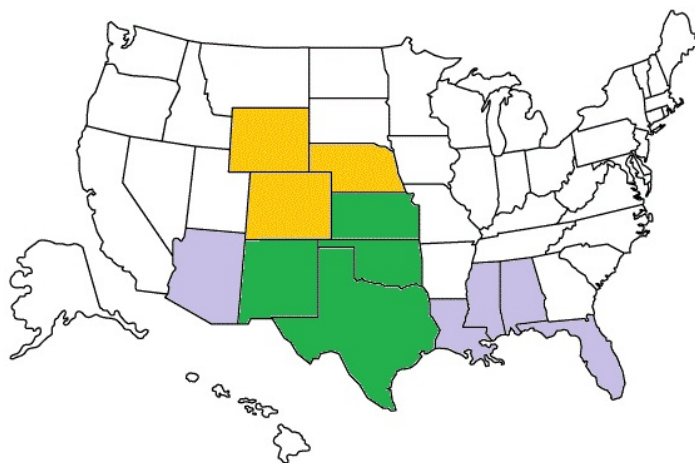

### **May 2018 – Motorcycle Awareness Month** **By Ralph Spencer, Motorist Awareness Coordinator**

A recent issue of *Clutch & Chrome Motorcycle Magazine* reminded me that, in addition to getting one month closer to a summer of open roads and Rocky Mountain adventures in Colorado, May is also Motorcycle Awareness Month, thirty-one days of reminding road-users to look out for bikers. It's no secret that motorcycle safety organizations and state highway departments also use the month to offer tips to bikers, such as what to wear as well as how to ride. I'm sure all my readers have seen the effort Colorado makes each May to remind drivers to Watch Out for Motorcycles on the electronic signs that cross over many Colorado highways.

Neon t-shirts with "Do you see me now" printed on the back in big, bold letters were the biker fashion of choice at a celebration organized by Texas' Department of Transportation. TxDOT officials joined city leaders, emergency medical personnel and motorcyclists to launch the "Share the Road: Look Twice for Motorcycles" campaign. "What we're seeing is that our four-wheeled vehicles are not paying attention when they are at a stop sign. They're not looking to the left, to the right and to the left again, and they are pulling out in front of motorcyclists," said Texas Department of Public Safety spokeswoman Robbie Barrera.

distracted driving and over-reliance on new driver-assist technology. "Also, they are not paying attention when they want to turn left. The motorcycle, which is smaller than a passenger car, is heading in the opposite direction and they're turning in front of them," Barrera said. "So, the message we need to get out there is Look Twice."

Distracted driving is dangerous for all road users, claiming 3,477 lives in 2015 alone, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Another 391,000 people were injured in crashes that involved distracted driving. Distractions include any activity that takes the driver's focus off driving. The NHTSA provides these examples: Talking or texting on a phone, eating and drinking, talking to people in the vehicle, and fiddling with the stereo, entertainment or navigation system.

The American Motorcyclist Association could be considered at the heart of Motorcycle Awareness Month. This special month was initially launched by the AMA in the early 1980s and adopted by many state motorcycle-rights organizations, government entities and AMA-sanctioned clubs, and continues to be observed each May. This year the motorcycle advocacy group issued a special appeal to motorists to be aware of their driving environment, to check

Among the top issues affecting motorcyclist safety this year are

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mirrors and blind spots before changing lanes, and to watch for motorcyclists.

“With its warmer weather and increased riding, May is an opportune time to educate the non-riding public about the safety issues that motorcyclists face on every outing,” said AMA President and CEO Rob Dingman. “Our hope is that calling special attention to motorcyclists early in the prime riding season will keep motorists on alert through summer and fall as well.” With the development of driver-assistance technology, such as adaptive cruise control, automated braking, and lane-assist, some drivers may believe that distractions, such as texting while driving, hold less potential for harm. Trusting their cars, instead of their eyes, ears and training, can create dangerous situations for drivers and nearby traffic. Unfortunately, motorcyclists are at much greater risk when things go awry.

Motorcycle Ohio (MO), part of the Ohio Department of Public Safety’s (ODPS) Office of Criminal Justice Services (OCJS), has partnered with Quaker Steak to kick off its state-wide Ride SMART motorcycle safety campaign at five Quaker Steak and Lube locations around the state during their scheduled “Bike Nights,” raising awareness about all aspects of motorcycle safety including: Ride Sober. Ride Motorcycle Endorsed. Ride Alert. Use the Right Gear. Ride Trained. Ride SMART.

The Connecticut State Police issued a press release reminding motorcyclists to be safe as well as offering tips for

motorcycle safety awareness month. Police say Connecticut State Law requires motorcyclists to wear eye protection and encourages riders to also wear helmets that meet CT and U.S. DOT standards. However, if riders want the best possible chance in the event of an accident, police note that leather pants, gloves, boots, and a jacket also protect riders during falls.

May is used to remind other road-users that motorcyclists are not only out and about, but also that they have as much right to the entire lane they’re travelling in as motorists. Experts are quick to pass along defensive riding tips. Among these are to avoid riding in vehicles’ blind spots and to be even more cautious at intersections and during bad weather. Allow me to leave you with a very sobering statistic during this glorious Hug-Your-Mom month: 57% of motorcycle fatalities involve one or more other vehicles!

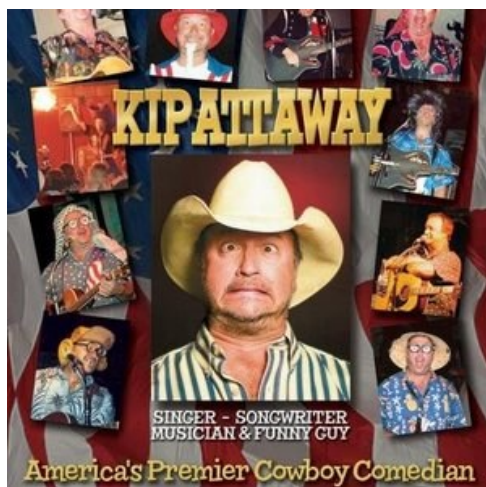
