The Battle of Pea Ridge By Becky Ackerman, Ride Coordinator

Last September, when we visited the Drakes and Fishers in Arkansas, we had time to visit the Pea Ridge National Military Park, located just east of Bella Vista. This 4,300-acre park honors those who fought here in March 1862 during the Civil War. Following is a synopsis of that battle.

By the spring of 1862, Union forces had pushed Confederates south and west through Missouri into northwestern Arkansas. On the night of March 6, 1862, Confederate Maj. Gen. Earl Van Dorn and his 16,000-man Army of the West set out to counterattack the Union position near Pea Ridge. Hoping to move quickly, in a fateful decision, Van Dorn ordered the supply trains far to the rear. Learning of Van Dorn's approach, some 10,000 Federals in Brig. Gen. Samuel R. Curtis' Army of the Southwest marched to meet the Rebel advance the next day. The forces met near Elkhorn Tavern just three miles south of the Missouri border and fighting quickly ensued. Two Confederate generals, Brig. Gens. Ben McCulloch and James McQueen McIntosh, were killed in the action, halting the Rebel momentum. By nightfall, the Confederates controlled Elkhorn Tavern and the Telegraph Road. Curtis consolidated his force during the night, and the next day, counterattacked near the tavern and, by successfully employing his artillery, slowly forced the Rebels back. Running short of ammunition due to the absence of supply support, Van Dorn abandoned the battlefield, leaving Arkansas virtually defenseless. With the Confederate defeat, the Union controlled the border state of Missouri for the next two years.









This last one is Elkhorn Tavern. It was fenced off for repairs at the time.





Motorcycle Safety – a Two-Way Street By Ralph K. Spencer, Treasurer/Motorist Awareness Coordinator

I am starting to see quite a few motorcycles on the road and will see many more in the coming months. However, and there is always a however in life, in addition to respecting your bike and continuing to improve your riding skills, this is only half the story. Wait for it . . . Wait for it . . . Motorists have a major responsibility in keeping motorcyclists safe on the road. Thus, the title of my article. As riders, we can only control what we are doing while in the rider's seat, we cannot control the fourwheelers, who greatly outnumber us.

A few sobering stats for you to consider: In 2016, according to the National Safety Council, 4,976 motorcycle riders and passengers died in crashes, and nonfatal injuries totaled 88,000. Yes, you read those numbers correctly. Fatalities among motorcycle riders and passengers have increased nearly 3% from 2006, driven largely by an 8% increase in 2015. Additionally, motorcycles make up only 3% of all registered vehicles and only 0.7 of all vehicle miles traveled in the U.S. Despite this 3% number, motorcyclists accounted for 13% of all traffic fatalities in 2016. Yikes!!! Another dazzling statistic is that 26% of riders who died in a motorcycle crash in 2016 were alcohol-impaired. This last stat reminds me of what my Registered Nurse daughter says after many of her 12 hour shifts in the ER, "It is simply amazing what people do to themselves and their loved ones." Finally, and not surprisingly,

91% of riders who died in a motorcycle crash in 2016 were male. Have I got your attention yet?!? No? Please read on. Unfortunately, 36% of all fatalities in 2016 $(36\% \times 4,976 = 1,791)$ were older riders, age 50 and older. That would be us, my friends, that would be us!!!

As noted above, the vast majority of vehicles on the road are NOT motorcycles. They are cars, trucks, and vans. It is not beyond the realm of possibility that the drivers of these vehicles rarely think about motorcycles. And, adding insult to injury (literally), it is usually these drivers who violate the motorcyclist's right-of-way. As we all know, the driver with the most lug nuts almost always wins! Why is it that these drivers consistently violate our right-of-way? There are several reasons: Motorcycles are relatively small, and drivers often do not see them. Drivers do not anticipate a motorcycle's movements. The driver's view of the motorcyclist is obstructed, often by the vehicle's blind spots or other vehicles. And finally, the driver is distracted (see my March MAP article in this same newsletter!) or under the influence of who knows what substances. How the heck can we defend ourselves against these almost insurmountable odds??? I have ideas, which I will include in my May 2019 article.

Until then, be careful, darn it, and continue to Share the Road - Safely!!!



Our Fourth Alaska Adventure – Summer 2018 (Part 5) South through BC and NW USA By Peter Keppler

In mid-August, we left the Alaska Highway near Watson Lake and headed south on the Cassair Highway through central British Columbia.



The Cassair Highway is much improved over the last few years and would now normally be a pleasant, scenic ride. Unfortunately, we got caught in the worst fire season ever with over 500 wildfires burning in BC and the province being in extreme fire alert. The smoke was so heavy that visibility was limited to ¼ mile most of the time and a number of towns were being evacuated.





We made it to Mountain Shadows RV Park 200 miles south of the Alaska Highway where we camped for two nights. This RV park is one of the nicest we found, small

with only 30 campsites, in a beautiful valley next to a lake. Again because of the smoke from the fires, we couldn't really enjoy the area. This was the second time where April put our cat, Ramses, outdoors on a leash and let him wander outside the camper, the first time being in Homer. She had him out several more times before we got home.



Another 150 miles down the Cassair and 40 miles west on a spur road we end up in Stewart, BC which is next to Hyder, AK, where we had camped on our first ride to Alaska in 2006. Hyder is in the southeast corner of Alaska and the first town you can get to by road coming from the lower 48. Not much in Hyder anymore, but worth the visit for the Fishing Bridge Park where you can



usually see bears fishing for salmon in Bear

Creek and then further up the road get a good view of Salmon Glacier. We didn't get to see either bears (not fishing today) or the glacier because of low clouds and rain.

Next stop was Prince Rupert on the west coast of BC, a major shipping port, western terminus of the Canadian National Railway, and Alaska State Ferry Terminal. Prince Rupert is what I envision an Irish or Norwegian fishing village and shipping port would like look – in a valley, surrounded by hills, and houses and cottages on the hillsides. We only spent one night in Prince Rupert and then drove east on the trans-Canada Yellowhead Highway 16 to Smithers.

At Smithers, we got on the bikes and rode up to the Mt. Hudson Bay Ski Area. Not a nice ride, it was slow going as the road was rough gravel and the view wasn't all that great because of haze and cloud cover.

From Smithers we traveled east on the Yellowhead Highway to St. George in heavy smoke near some of the major fires. St. George is at the crossroads of two major highways in central BC and good place to fuel and re-stock on provisions.

Heading south on Highway 97 from St. George, we stopped at Loon Bay Resort, which has a nice campground but, due to the dense smoke, you couldn't see much of the lake. Looking directly at the sun you could just see a large orange ball in the sky.





From there, we drove southeast and caught Canada Highway 1 (main east-west route) at Kamloops and then another 200 miles to



Golden which is on the eastern border of BC. We camped at the Whispering Spruce Campground which had recently had a fire in their office trailer and was pretty rundown, so not a great place to stay. We planned to ride across the mountains to Lake Louise only about 50 miles away, but my new wireless headset failed, and we didn't want to risk riding without being able to communicate (turned out I just needed to remove and reinstall the battery).

After two nights in Golden, which isn't really anything like Golden, CO, we drove south on Highway 95 through the resort towns of Radium and Hot Springs to Creston and the Pair-A-Dice RV Park. Again, lots of smoke in the air and poor visibility so slow travel. This area is known for fruit orchards and truck-farming with lots of fruit stands and farmers' markets.

From Creston, we headed south to Newport and North Spokane. At the Canadian border, we had to give up any fruit and vegetables we had in the RV, so we lost a couple of tomatoes and apples.

The next stop was the North Spokane RV Campground, probably the most swanky park we stayed in this whole trip. All sites are concrete pads with patches of grass between and, of course, a pool, recreation hall, fitness room, etc.



Here, we got the bikes out and went for a longer ride, north to Colville and then southwest on back roads in the Washington wheat country ending up coming back to Spokane on I-90, about 125 miles.

After Spokane, we stopped in Coeur d'Alene for a couple of nights at a nice campground on the Lake. From there it was pretty much a direct shot home on I-90 to Butte, then south on I-15 to Idaho Falls, on to Jackson and Teton National Park and then Riverton, where we rode by April's former ranch that she had leased to her cousin.

From Riverton, we headed to Manila UT where we stayed in a nice KOA campground and rode the bikes to the Flaming Gorge dam. After Flaming Gorge, we headed to Craig and then on to the Grand Junction KOA.

In Grand Junction, Pat and Dave Andrews met up with us and we rode to Gateway to tour the car museum, and then went to Ridgeway for dinner at the True Grit Restaurant. The next day, we went out to the Andrews' place outside Delta and had a good visit. From Grand Junction, we made one more stop at the River Dance RV Resort in Gypsum before getting home the afternoon of September 11.

By the time we got home, we had traveled over 8,500 miles in the RV and just under 800 miles on the bikes. Other than the floods in Montana and the fires in British Columbia, it was another good trip to Alaska, and we look forward to the next time.


