Seven State Road Trip By Becky Ackerman, Ride Coordinator

When the snow was flying in March, Mike was busy studying maps to lay out a route that would enable us to ride seven states in three days. He said we could do it easily so waiting for a break in the weather when it would be nice in all 7 states was our next challenge. As we were approaching Friday, April $5^{\text {th }}$, it looked like our break in the weather was going to hit perfectly over the weekend, so Mike made our reservations; we packed up and prepared for a fun ride on the bikes.

Friday morning, we woke up to blue sky and sunshine, just what the doctor ordered. We

headed up 85 (State \#1) to Cheyenne (State

\#2) where we picked up I-80 and rode east to Sidney (State \#3) for lunch. First time we've ever seen a Subway in a log house! We continued east to J ulesburg where we
went south on 385 to Holyoke. It just so happened they were having a big track meet at the high school and we saw buses from five different schools. It was awesome weather for that! From there we rode east on 6 to Imperial, NE, a town we've never been to before. Imperial is the county seat of Chase County and in 2010 the population was a mere 2,071. Welcome to rural America!


We stayed at The Balcony House, a B \& B owned by a couple who moved there from Denver. The building was constructed outside of Imperial in the 1880s and initially served as a school. In 1921, the Nebraska Fire Marshal condemned the school, and the building was moved to its current location. A two-story addition was added to the building after its move to replace a similar addition which was left at the original site. At its new site, the building served as a hotel for a tourist camp along the Detroit-Lincoln-Denver Highway, a transcontinental highway which crossed Nebraska along the modern route of U.S. 6. The tourist camp became a prominent local

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business, hosting as many as 300 visitors in a day; it also hosted events, such as free concerts, and received regular coverage in the local newspaper. The camp closed in 1930 after the Great Depression reduced leisure travel and deprived the business of its customers.

As a $B$ \& $B$, it has five luxury rooms and serves a fantastic breakfast. Guests have their own kitchen and access to a fully stocked refrigerator and snacks. It has a wrap-around porch with patio furniture to sit and watch the world go by. The décor was rather eclectic, but it worked. It is right across the street from the court house which we discovered Saturday morning had nearly 100 buzzards roosting in the trees, but only on the south side. Was Alfred Hitchcock in town?

After a wonderful breakfast, we left Imperial riding south on 61 which turned into 161 in Kansas (State \#4). At Bird City we jogged west

to Wheeler to pick up 27 which we followed all the way south to Elkhart, right on the Oklahoma line. There we picked up 56 across Oklahoma (State \#5) to Clayton, NM


(State \#6) and continued south on 87 to


Texline, TX (State \#7) where we stopped for dinner. We soon learned there aren't a lot of choices in Texline so we took what we could get and rode back north to Clayton, which was a much larger town and had numerous hotels and restaurants, so we stayed Saturday night there.

Sunday morning, we woke up to sunshine, but it was pretty breezy and cool. We decided we wanted to take a different route home, so we rode north on 87 to Des Moines, just east of Capulin Volcano. The whole way we kept waiting for the sun to warm us up, but it just wasn't happening!

In Des Moines we followed 325 to Folsum where we stopped and donned our electrics. Our hands were freezing, and I was chilled to the bone. But wouldn't you know, it was finally beginning to warm up and I only needed the heat turned on long enough to thaw my hands outand then had to turn it off. But oh, did it feel good! Of course, Mike didn't even turn his on!

North of Folsum, we turned on 551 and followed it back in to Colorado where it

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became 389. That stretch of road is pretty incredible. You are straight east of Raton Pass and the canyons you ride through are really pretty. Then, you pop up on top and there is nothing but flat land and sage brush. We rode east on 160 over to Kim (the place we stopped at for breakfast last year is all closed up now) and continued north on 109 up to La J unta where we rode west on 50 past Rocky Ford to 71, which took us all the way to Limon.

It was time for a butt break and fuel, so we stopped at the only truck stop on the north side of I-70 to do just that. As we stood there having a snack, another Gold Wing pulled up to the pumps and tooted their horn at us. They were riding two-up and pulling a trailer. Who could that be?

It turned out to be former Chapter L members, Ryan and Vicki Rahjes, who now live down by Elizabeth. They had been out on the road since the previous Wednesday afternoon, $11 / 2$ days longer than us. But in that time, they rode to Big Bend National Park, across Texas to Dallas, down through
the Hill Country (the blue bonnets were spectacular they said) and back home. Our 1,088 miles seemed measly compared to their 2,400 miles but both couples had a good time.

Half an hour later, we were finally back on I-70 headed home.

All in all, it was a great ride and we enjoyed every minute of it. Thankfully, the weather held all the way. We had about 12 rain drops in Oklahoma on the windshield and that was it. The following Wednesday, we had our $2^{\text {nd }}$ snow storm after the bomb cyclone so we were so thankful we were able to squeeze this trip in between snow storms.

It just goes to show we have to jump on those nice days when we get the chance. Now we're itching for the snow and cold to leave us for another season so we can get out and ride more often.

## Motorcycle Saiety, a Two-Way Street (Cont.) by Ralph K. Spencer, Treasurer/Motorist Awareness Coordinator

As I pointed out in the last paragraph of my April article, "the vast majority of vehicles on the road are NOT motorcycles. They are cars, trucks, and vans. It is not beyond the realm of possibility that the drivers of these vehicles rarely think about motorcycles. And, adding insult to injury (literally), it is usually these drivers who violate the motorcyclist's right of way. As we all know, the driver with the most lug nuts almost always wins! Why is it that these drivers consistently violate our right of way?

There are several reasons: Motorcycles are relatively small, and drivers often do not see them. Drivers do not anticipate motorcycles' movements. The driver's view of the motorcyclist is obstructed, often by the vehicle's blind spots or other vehicles. And finally, the driver is distracted (see my March MAP article in this same newsletter!) or under the influence of who knows what substances. How the heck can we defend ourselves against these almost insurmountable odds??? I have ideas, which I will include in my J une 2019 article."

So, here I am pushing the May due-date-time envelope, again, and hoping that I can get this article sent to our hardnosed editor who is not the sort to suffer fools gladly, even those such as me with a myriad of excuses for missing the article deadline!

Allow me to remind everyone that motorcycles make up only $3 \%$ of all registered vehicles and only . 7 of all vehicle miles traveled in the U.S. Despite this 3\% number, motorcyclists accounted for $13 \%$ of all traffic fatalities in 2016. Here are some of the ideas I promised you last month that can help defend ourselves against the four wheelers, who greatly outnumber us:

* A helmet is the most important equipment a biker can use, with all due respect to our H/D brethren. In 2016, 1,876 motorcyclists who died were not wearing a helmet. Helmets are estimated to be 37\% effective in preventing fatal injuries for drivers and 41\% for passengers, according to Injury Facts 2017.

1) A full-coverage helmet offers the most protection.
2) Look for the DOT sticker, which guarantees the helmet meets safety standards required by law3)
3) Never buy a used helmet. Helmets are useless after they've been worn in a crash.

* Choose a bike that fits you.
* Invest in antilock brakes.
* Know the rules of the road.
* Be aware that riding with a passenger requires considerably more skill.
* Never drink and ride.
* Drive defensively, especially at intersections, where $1 / 2$ of all collisions occur.
* Watch for hazards like potholes, manhole covers, oil slicks, puddles, debris, railroad tracks, and gravel.
* Assume you are invisible to other motorists and position yourself to be seen.
* Use headlights day and night.
- Be courteous and do not weave in and out of lanes.
* Always follow the speed limit.
* Wear reflective clothing and boots that cover the ankles.
* Wear goggles, glasses or use a face shield that is ventilated to prevent fog, and make sure it's clear when riding at night.
